THE DIGITAL SAT vs. THE ACT

Knowing what to expect on the digital SAT and the paper-based ACT is the best way to decide which test will better suit your strengths. We broke down each exam's content and formatting so you're prepared for test day.

WRITING (combined with Reading section)

- Tests grammar rules related to verbs, pronouns, transitions, sentence structure, and punctuation
- Questions ask about sentences within a passage
- At least one passage with graphics

WRITING (separate from Reading section)

- Tests same material as SAT
- Questions ask about sentences within a passage
- No graphics

NO SCIENCE SECTION

SCIENCE

- Tests ability to analyze charts/graphs and draw conclusions
- Focuses more on logic and scientific thinking, not on actual scientific knowledge

*Super scoring is the process of taking the highest section scores from multiple test sittings to create a new composite score.
